Dear Members and Friends of Union Presbyterian Church,

One of my family's "new" favorite musicals is "The Greatest Showman," the highly fictionalized retelling of the story of P.T. Barnum. I think that one of the best songs in the musical happens toward the end of the movie. Phillip Carlyle, a playwright recruited by Barnum to help drum up publicity wants desperately to win the heart of African American trapeze artist, Anne Wheeler. Wheeler is understandably reluctant, knowing that they would never be accepted socially



because of her skin color. This problem is dramatized in the song, "Rewrite the Stars." The two sing to one another as Wheeler rehearses part of her high flying act. In the end, Carlyle, wanting desperately to be with Wheeler as she swings above him about the room, runs to the balcony area and flings himself to her, trusting that she will not let him fall. There is no safety net below... much like their feelings for one another.

It is a great moment in the movie. But I have to admit that in real life, I much prefer watching trapeze artists do their acrobatic feats over safety nets. I don't know about you, but I still find trapeze stunts electrifying even when I don't also have to worry that one wrong move could bring utter disaster.

Juan Carlos Ortiz uses the trapeze as an interesting illustration for Christian life. He argues that in some ways Christians live their lives on the trapeze. We spin and twirl. We catch one another and help keep each other from falling out of the sky. It is easy for us to begin to believe that our call as Christians is to allow the world to watch us do these amazing twists and flips so they will say, "Wow look at how those Christians live! Look at how they love one another! Look at how they do their jobs and raise their families!" But I wonder... is this really our call as followers of Christ?

Over this last month I have been helping lead a confirmation class for our older youth. And one of my favorite weeks to teach is when when we get to talk about the Reformation. I love the "5 Alones" of the Reformation (Grace Alone, Christ Alone, Faith Alone, Scripture Alone, and To the Glory of God Alone). I've always thought it to be an incredibly succinct way to describe salvation and our walk with God!

In the book, "Grace Alone: Salvation as a Gift of God," Carl R. Trueman writes how one of the greatest stories in the Old Testament that demonstrates God's grace is in the story of Jonah. After Jonah finally decides to obey God and go to Nineveh to preach, Jonah becomes furious when he's successful.

The Ninevites actually repent and God spares the city. Jonah tells God that he is upset with this because he does not like the people of Nineveh and he knew that the Lord is a gracious God who would forgive these people if they repented (Jonah 4:2). Trueman argues that this is an incredibly ironic response because Jonah knows that it is only "the fact of God's graciousness that meant Jonah himself could enjoy the relationship with the Lord that he did." Jonah did not want others to experience the unmerited and amazing gift that he himself had received from God. Not only did Jonah receive this grace through his covenanted relationship with God as an Israelite but he also just literally received even more unmerited mercy when God saved him with the fish. But Trueman wonders if part of the reason that Jonah's reaction seems so particularly ugly in this passage is "…because God's grace is so beautiful." The corrupt city of Nineveh was delivered from judgement and brought into joyful communion with God. Jonah's bitterness just makes God's glorious grace even more noticeable.

So I wonder, as trapeze artists for God, is our goal to look amazing as we flip and fly through the air? Or is our real goal to keep pointing at the safety net we fly over? I think that we are only up there on those wires to begin with because of that net (God's grace shown through Christ's death and resurrection). Isn't the only reason we are brave enough to listen to God's call and minister to others outside of our comfort zones is because we know that God's gracious net is there catch us? And when we do fall... when we fall short, when we miss God's leading, when we get out of step with our fellow trapeze artists, or when we try to reach just a little further than God intends... when we fall, is that really a bad thing or is it another opportunity we have to allow God's grace to be even more noticeable. Is our primary goal to wow the world from the trapeze or to live a life that allows other to see how we keep pointing to the net?



SABBATICAL FOR PASTOR JAMES

During the **month of July**, Pastor James will be on Sabbatical. Each week, there will be an emergency pastoral contact who you can reach through one of the Elders serving on Session. Also please note that due to the Sabbatical, we will not be celebrating the Lords Supper during the month of July. Please keep Pastor James and his family in your prayers as he uses this time to recharge and prepare to come back to Union with a renewed sense of call and vision for the church.



On May 24th, Frank Dimmock, the Deputy Director from the Nkhoma Mission Hospital in Malawi met with pastors from Presbyterian Churches in the Gaston County Area to give an update on what is going on in the region.

Things are hard in Malawi right now. Although in the last couple years, Covid-19 did impact Malawi (closing Ebenezer School for a time, and straining the resources of Nkhoma Mission Hospital), its impact was much smaller in Malawi than elsewhere in the world. This is probably largely due to the fact that the median age in Malawi is only 18 years.

The war in Ukraine is having a much larger impact. Food and fuel prices are at historic levels. Since 83% of the population lives in rural areas and 70% live on less than \$1.90 a day, this is truly a challenge. The cost for the fuel needed to bus students to the school and the cost for the hospital to buy supplies and get them to its rural clinics and mobile ambulances is significant.

However, despite these challenges, Ebenezer School and Nkhoma Hospital continue to grow. Ebenezer School began in 2008 with 11 children and this year's enrollment is 380. Since 2016, 4 classes of students have graduated and 3 students are in University. The school currently employs 23 teachers.





The Nkhoma hospital's mission continues to be to provide quality healthcare for all, inspired by the love of Jesus Christ. There are currently 290 beds that provide medical, surgical, adult and pediatric medicine, neonatal, maternity, ophthalmic, Palliative Care, mental health, and care for TB, HIV, COVID, burns, and dental. The hospital currently staffs 526 including 5 chaplains. The hospital has 2 "mobile ambulances" that are used to get medical supplies to rural clinics and villages. The hospitals biggest need right now is with staff housing. Many of the current staff housing is very old and in need of replacement

and repair and as a growing hospital there is need for even more housing. Each 3 bedroom cement block house costs about \$45,000 to build. The hospital is also hoping to raise funds to build a new 1.3 million dollar surgical building with maternity wing.



Please continue to keep Malawi in your prayers. If you feel led to give financially, you can contact W&S or Pastor James. There are ways you can support the hospital and school's ongoing work, help provide scholarships for the students at the school, or support the hospital's staff housing needs and proposed surgical building.




WHAT'S YOUR FAVORITE HYMN?
