

Dear Members and Friends of Union Presbyterian Church,

Do you know where the phrase “wear your heart on your sleeve” comes from? No one knows for sure, but 2 leading theories on the origin fit right in with February and Valentines Day! Both stories hail from the Middle Ages. One is about a time when single noble men would draw a name each year to determine who would be their “valentine” for that next year. They would pin the noblewoman’s name to their sleeve during a special feast, literally wearing their heart on their sleeve. The other possible origin for the phrase comes from jousting tournaments. Often a knight would dedicate their match to a woman of the court. Sometimes the knight would tie a ribbon, handkerchief, or other item from that woman around his arm to let everyone at the joust know who’s heart was on his sleeve.

It’s funny how a saying like “wearing one’s heart on your sleeve,” once likely tied to a romantic gesture, is more often used today very differently. Today it’s more often used to describe someone who wants to joyfully share the things they are most passionate about with the world. It is in that vein that I want to share with all of you something that I am very passionate about. I don’t usually talk about it much but I would like to start wearing this thing on my sleeve. And like the phrase this thing I love is something that also has a long history. The thing I love... well...I love church confessions of faith. I really do. I love them A WHOLE LOT.

It helps to be part of a denomination that has 12 different creeds, catechisms, declarations, and confessions in its Book of Confessions. But my love for church confessions goes way beyond our own denomination. I just counted and it looks like I have about a dozen books about the histories of different confessions from various church denominations. I love to read about what was going on with these churches when the confessions were created, to learn the history behind them, and to try to understand how the church in different times has linked their struggles to Scripture. I find it all incredibly fascinating. It is something that merges my love of history, my love of the church, and my love of theology together into one thing.

A couple weeks back I was floored while reading the book, “The Need For Creeds Today: Confessional Faith in a Faithless Age,” by J.V. Fesko. In the opening chapters of the book, Fesko argues that creeds are not only still important for the universal church today, but that they also have a Scriptural basis. I had never thought about that before; could the Bible itself demonstrate the importance of confessions?

I particularly liked what Fresko wrote about “Paul’s trustworthy sayings.” Five times in Paul’s Pastoral Epistles (1 Timothy 1: 15; 3:1; 4:7-9; 2 Timothy 2: 11-13; and Titus 3: 4-8), Paul gives Timothy or Titus some advice by saying, “this is a trustworthy saying.” Fresko argues that these five trustworthy sayings cover a wide range of topics and while they indirectly tie to things Christ taught or to ethical standards described in the Old Testament, none of them come directly from Scripture. This means that Christians were already creating for themselves common sayings and confessions about what it means to believe in Christ and follow him. In the same way in Deuteronomy 6 where the people of Israel were told to take the story of how God had saved them from Egypt and to teach it to their children, bind it to their hands and heads, and write it on their doorposts and gates, the early church was taking what they knew about Christ and putting it into their own words. Isn’t that what a church confession is?

A few months back, our Session put together its own “confessional document.” Basically it is a document that expressed what Session hoped we at Union “believed” in terms of who Christ is and how we are called to serve him. We live in a country that increasingly invites individuals to believe whatever they want for themselves and where overall church attendance continues to decline. One result of this is that more and more people in this country have never been to church and only understand what Christianity is about by what they’ve seen the church do in the news or in books and movies. Today, it just might be more important than ever that we wear what we believe about Christ on our sleeves. More than ever we need our sleeves to joyfully proclaim God’s love and grace and what Christ has done for us. More than ever we need to demonstrate who Christ is in all we say and do. May we all more and more often wear our hearts, Jesus Christ, on our sleeves!

Week 2, February 12-18, Step Out

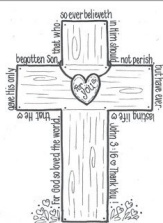
This Week Consider Praying For God to help us Step/Reach Out:
