Dear Friends and Members of Union Presbyterian Church,

My whole life, I've loved to be out and about in bare feet: on the beach, in the house, in the backyard. Whenever the terrain, appropriateness, and weather allow it, I want my feet free of shoes and socks. In Junior High, I saw advertised a new "sandal" (if you could call it that) "from Australia" (or so they said) that I just had to ran out and get. It was the flat bottom of a sandal, like a flip flop without the strap. One side of the flat surface was covered with a sticky Wearing it was like being in bare feet all the time. The sandals only had one problem.... the sticky side. When we walk, our whole foot is not always touching every part of the soul of the shoe and the ground is covered with rocks and sand and dirt and stuff. So my sandals got absolutely disgusting every time I wore them. They stuck to my feet fine... but a whole lot of other things stuck to them as well.

For my entire life as a Christian, parts of the church have been involved in a music war. It is a war that has pitted hymns against praise songs, organs against pianos, older generations against newer generations, dated songs that use words that no one uses anymore against new songs that use the same few words over and over and over again. I believe that most of this worship music war is due to the fact that music is catchy. We all get stuck to certain songs (much like I was stuck to those "Australian sandals"). I bet the stickiness of songs have made all of us are guilty of thinking or saying one of these things at least once in lifetimes:

- "No one makes hymns like these anymore." This phrase assumes that there are not still people out there writing hymns (not just praise songs) today. What we actually mean when we say this is that no one is currently writing THESE hymns anymore (the hymns we are stuck on).
- "What terrible worship this Sunday. We didn't sing any songs I knew." Christian worship has been around a very long time. There are thousands upon thousands of songs. What we often actually mean by is that we didn't get to hear a song we are stuck on this week.
- "I just didn't feel anything in the worship this week." Often, what we are actually saying here is that in worship this week we didn't sing any songs we are stuck on. The songs were ones we haven't heard enough or heard too many times...
- "I like praise songs best, they are just so much more catchy." This is like saying, "I like songs that I can get stuck to easy, isn't that the most important part of a worship song?"

I love Chris Anderson's book, "Theology That Sticks: The Life-Changing Power of Exceptional Hymns." Anderson accepts the fact that we are all stuck on music. He admits that he loves a huge variety of music himself... all kinds of worship music, and other kinds of music also (both old and new). In "Theology That Sticks," Anderson seems far less concerned about worship wars and the fact that we all are stuck to our own favorite songs, than he is about the other stuff that is stuck to those songs we love (much like all the dirt and gunk that got stuck to the "Australian sandals" that were stuck on me).

Anderson writes that there are thousands of songs available to churches. Every time an individual or church decides to use a certain song to worship God we are saying no to tons of others. For this reason, he argues that we should pick good ones. Not stuff with a bunch of dirt on it. We should all be less worried about what songs we are stuck to and more worried about what is sticky to us with the songs we sing. Every time we sing a worship song, it is like reciting a statement of faith. We are not only telling those around us what we believe in that song but we are also reciting for ourselves what we believe.

Anderson holds that while we all want to sing songs that are unifying, inspiring, and touching... if one of our favorites also has a line that is Biblically questionable or confusing, why not sing one of the hundreds of other similarly unifying, inspiring, and touching songs instead? Instead of focusing on what songs we are stuck to, what if we all focused more on what is getting stuck to us when we sing them?

Anderson writes about one time he took a tour with a group of pastors to Northern Israel. While down in a bunker, hearing about the Six-Day War, one of pastors suggested that they all sing the first verse of "A Mighty Fortress in Our God" (they were in a refuge after all). But this is a TERRIBLE song to sing only verse 1 of. In that first verse we sing about how Satan's power is great and how no one on earth is his equal. It is only while singing verse 2 that we sing about how much greater Jesus is than that. If anybody heard that group of pastors and did not know the rest of that song, I wonder what they would have learned about God that day.

This Lent, I've decided to take a closer look at the music I worship with... I'm going to try and catch myself before I say, "no one makes songs like this anymore," and "I didn't feel anything from worship this week." Maybe I can even stop looking so intently on which songs I'm stuck on and more on what is getting stuck on me.

- 1/3 will go thru the Medical Benevolence Foundation to support the work at Nkhoma Mission Hospital
- 1/3 will go to **Frontier Fellowship** to support local ministries in one specific region of the world.

We hope you will be able to give generously this Easter!

RECIPIENTS OF THE OFFERING

In the 3 weeks leading up to Easter we will spend time in worship highlighting 1 of each of the 3 organizations supported this year.

- World Renew Disaster Response Service: For over 50 years DRS has coordinated with national & international partners to help individuals & communities recover after hurricanes, floods, earthquakes, wild-fires, and other natural disasters. DRS has helped over 175, 000 individuals rebuild their homes & lives.
- Nkhoma Mission Hospital is a 290 bed hospital that sees over 53,000 outpatients, admits over 19,000 people, does over 3,000 operations, and delivers over 3,000 babies each year. It also supports 19 rural health centers and is in the process of building a new Surgical building. This surgical center would make Nkhoma hospital the 3rd or 4th hospital in the entire country of Malawi with an ICU. The Medical Benevolence Foundation is dedicated to building long-term partnerships to help local churches meet their community's healthcare needs and share the Good News of Christ.
- Frontier Fellowship: Did you know that 2 of the world's 8 billion people have never heard about Jesus? Frontier Fellowship partners with local ministries in Africa, the Middle East, Central and East Asia, and Southeast Asia to help unreached communities hear the Good News of Christ often for the first time.
